SOCIAL WORK

All Social Work classes need to be evaluated by the department chair since ORU is accredited by the Council On Social Work Education and fully accountable to them. One exception might be Introduction to Social Work, so long as we can be satisfied that it was taught by a social worker and not another behavioral scientist of some sort. Also, Introduction to Social Services, as taught by some community colleges or four-year colleges, is usually not sufficient to satisfy the Council. Therefore, evaluation of courses by the Social Work Program Director is necessary.
