What If?

Former Assistant Secretary for Health & Human Services Lynn Johnson created the ALL IN for FOSTER ADOPTION Challenge as a national call for partners in every state, including governors, non-profit agencies, courts, churches, community organizations, foster alumni and the public, to commit to being ALL IN to find "Forever Families" for the 125,000 waiting children in foster care. What if, today we respond to the Lord as He asks us to care for the poor, the hungry, the scared, the addicted, the homeless, the abused and the neglected? And imagine what we can all do as we come forward to change the world—together. With a combined strategy of primary prevention on the front-end when families are struggling and need intervention, as well as communities wrapping around those who step-up to adopt waiting youth, the 125,000 could rapidly be reduced to zero if every state would focus on that number. This group is at eminent risk of ending up in another system, such as juvenile justice, homelessness or becoming trafficked.

Bio

Lynn Johnson is currently the Vice President of Children & Youth Initiatives for CityServe International. Her role focuses on driving national initiatives that empower churches to combat the crisis of children aging out of the foster care system, adoption, human trafficking, and empowering young women to be leaders in their communities. She brings determination, passion, and a strong belief in the dignity of all people no matter the challenge before them. Her only passion greater than serving vulnerable and exploited populations is her deep faith in our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Before this work, Mrs. Johnson was the Assistant Secretary for the Administration for Children and Families in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. In this Senate-confirmed position, she led a large agency with a budget of over 59 billion dollars and over 60 programs to improve and enhance the lives of our most challenged children, individuals, and families.

As the Executive Director of Jefferson County Department of Human Services in Colorado, she used a comprehensive lens to provide dignity and respect for our most vulnerable members of the community to end poverty, eliminate abuse and neglect and stop the trafficking of children. Appointed to several committees, her expertise ranges from child welfare to welfare reform and criminal justice. Mrs. Johnson has won numerous awards for Excellence in successful transformations of Human Services and customer service.

Before joining the Jefferson County Department of Human Services, Mrs. Johnson ran a firm consulting on issues on mental health, high-risk youth, developmental disabilities, child welfare, and early childhood education. She was Chief of Staff to Lieutenant Governor Jane E. Norton and was Deputy Director for Policy as well as Policy Advisor on Human Services issues to Governor Bill Owens.

Mrs. Johnson has a bachelor's degree from the University of Northern Colorado and a master's degree in Social Work from Arizona State University. She is a graduate of the Federal Judicial Center National Leadership Development Program and the Senior Executives in State and Local Government through the Harvard Kennedy School for Executive Education. She has been married for 36 years and has three adult children.

The Application of Christian Music Therapy in a Foster Group Home

Dr. Hayoung Lim, the Director of the Oral Roberts University Music Therapy Program and Clinic, will present her editorial from the Journal of the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning for Christians in Higher Education regarding Christian music therapy. Samantha Nossaman, the Clinical Training Coordinator and Supervisor for the Oral Roberts University Music Therapy Program, will present on the use of music therapy in the foster care system. This presentation will include a current home receiving services under supervision of Mrs. Nossaman. She will present testimonials from care givers, case managers, and the group members.



Dr. Hayoung Lim is Director of the Music Therapy Program and Clinic, and Professor of Music at Oral Roberts University. Dr. Lim is a board-certified, neurologic music therapist (NMT Fellow) and current member of the American Music Therapy Association (AMTA). She earned her bachelor's degree in Cello Performance from the Catholic University of Korea, and master's degree in both Cello Performance and Music Therapy from the Illinois State University. In 2007, she received her Ph.D. degree in music education with an emphasis on music therapy from the University of Miami. Her dissertation title was "The Effect of Developmental Speech-Language Training through Music in Speech Production in Children with Autism Spectrum Disorders." She completed her music therapy internship at Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, IL, and worked as a full-time music therapist at the Cleveland Music School Settlement in Cleveland, OH. Dr. Lim also worked as the music therapy director at Children's Health & Education Management, Miami, FL and specialized in music therapy for children with Autism Spectrum Disorders. Dr. Lim joined ORU in 2014 and prior to her current appointment, worked as Director of Graduate Studies in Music Therapy at Sam Houston State University in Texas. In addition, Dr. Lim has worked as a concert cellist, performing numerous solo recitals and chamber music concerts (as a member of K-Piano Trio) in Seoul, Korea and the U.S.

Samantha Nossaman is the current clinical training coordinator and supervisor for the music therapy program at Oral Roberts University. Samantha Nossaman received her Bachelor of Arts in Piano with a minor in psychology from the University of Oklahoma in 2013. She achieved her Master of Music Therapy from Maryville University. Mrs. Nossaman completed her internship from Denton Independent School District under the supervision of Sherri Ross. Samantha Nossaman is currently a Board-Certified Music Therapist and a Licensed Professional Music Therapist in the state of Oklahoma. Mrs. Nossaman received training as a Registered Behavior Technician in Applied Behavior Analysis Therapy (ABA). She currently holds a Neurologic Music Therapy (NMT) credential, along with being a Certified Behavioral Health Case Manager Level CM II. Samantha Nossaman has clinical experience in various populations including children with developmental, behavioral and intellectual disorders; adolescents with developmental, behavioral, and intellectual disorders, geriatrics, hospice, physical rehabilitation, and individuals with psychiatric disorders. Samantha Nossaman is the illustrator of "La Salsa Plays the Blues". She works closely with other music therapists to advocate for music therapy in the Tulsa community.

Learn about steps that can be taken to help and support individuals through anxiety and fear through utilizing faith. This session covers several fears that people struggle with, including: the Boogieman of rejection, the Boogieman of failure, the Boogieman of the future, the Boogieman of death, and Boogieman of difference. By using real stories and experiences, this session will reveal how to rid oneself of the fear that once plagued and hindered their lives. This session provides a solution and strategy by utilizing biblical principles, and specifically taking a look at the life of the ultimate Boogieman killer in scripture, King David. By the end of this session you will be just like David; not running from your Boogieman in fear, but rather

Mr. Person is the co-founder of Person to Person Counseling services, with his wife Iris Person, that provides counseling services to disadvantaged and at-risk individuals and families. They also provide an array of seminars and workshops: marriage, boundaries, mental health. Darrin also serves as the Associate Pastor of the Praise Church located in Clovis, California where he has served for the past twenty years. Mr. Person preaches and teaches a message of hope, healing, and abundant living through Jesus Christ.

Professionally, Mr. Person also works as the Mentor Manager for Fresno Unified School District, the fourth largest school district in California, where he has implemented nationally recognized programs that serve thousands of students each year. Mr. Person is also an adjunct professor at Fresno State University and Fresno Pacific University.



Voices Of Experience: Discussing Spiritual Trauma

Spiritual trauma is a subject that is often left out of clinical discussion, as it is under-researched and often seen as a taboo topic among more conservative circles. It is important to include these experiences in the discussion of social work practice, as it recognizes the significant psychosocial effects that religion, culture, and spiritual practices have on the individual. If we are to utilize faith or religion in strengths-based interventions or as an element of resilience, we must first address any traumas or negative core beliefs the client may have as a result of religious experiences.

This session will primarily focus on giving a voice to those individuals with lived experiences, giving them an opportunity to share the pain, perspectives, and hope they have found through the impact of spiritual trauma. Listeners will be able to present themselves as learners, allowing these individuals to be the experts on their own experiences by providing first-hand insight and knowledge. Recommendations for clinicians, educators, and students will be given on how to recognize, assess, and ethically approach this issue in the field.



Michael Brose was born in Liberal, Kansas, and attended Oral Roberts University in Tulsa where he earned his bachelor's degree in social work in 1979. He attended the University of Kansas and graduated with an MSW in social work in 1980 before returning to Tulsa where he and his wife Maren have made their home since. Mike has worked extensively with individuals living with serious mental illness and their families. He has also worked in juvenile justice, medical social work, and geriatric mental health

care. He served as the Director of Family Therapy at St. John Medical Center from 1987 to 1992. He became the director of the Mental Health Association Oklahoma in 1993 and served as the CEO there for 27 years, overseeing growth from five employees to almost two hundred as a statewide organization. He currently practices privately with individuals and families, consults, and volunteers in the community and across the state.

The Spirit of Effective Helpers

Efforts to legitimize clinical interventions through the enterprise of evidence based practice have been at the forefront of clinical research for the past 70 years (Shakow et al., 1947). A major focus in clinical research has been to identify specific skills and techniques that can help clients with their problems, yet the search for evidence has been continually undermined and frustrated by a variety of scientific challenges, especially the challenge of elusive replicability in outcomes (Miller, Taylor, and West, 1980). Many researchers have assumed that this replicability challenge is the result of poor model adherence from clinician to clinician and study to study. Yet, the increased popularity of highly structured and manualized intervention models has not produced significantly better data.

In this presentation, we will explore a different dimension of effective helpers: the spirit and way of being of the individual counselor. It is proposed that there is something about the clinical presence of helpers and counselors that has a significant and measurable impact on clients and their outcomes. An overview of existing research that helps to define this "spirit" will be presented alongside an overview of future areas for continued exploration of the traits found in effective helpers (Miller & Moyers, 2021).

An overview of Motivational Interviewing (Miller & Rollnick, 2012) will be suggested as a framework for conceptualizing a pathway for developing and learning the spirit of effective helpers.

He has an extensive background in juvenile justice and forensic social work as well as in mental health and school based services with children and families. He teaches across the direct practice curriculum in the Anne and Henry Zarrow School of Social Work including courses in mental health, group work, advanced clinical social work theories of practice, and the integrative seminar. His research at OU focuses on clinical pedagogy related to Motivational Interviewing, Suicidality, and High-Fidelity Clinical Simulations.
