



## GRADUATE ENTRANCE EXAM INFORMATION

Graduate School of Theology and Ministry  
2010-2011

The School of Theology and Ministry requires a current exam score from **one** of two options for an application file to be considered by the Admissions Committee. Prospective students without a Masters degree from at least a regionally accredited institution (or a minimum of 12 graduate credit hours taken with a 2.5 or higher GPA) may choose to sit for either the Graduate Record Exam (GRE) or the Miller's Analogies Test (MAT).

### Graduate Record Examination (General Test)

The *Graduate Record Examination (General Test)* measures verbal, quantitative, and analytical skills that have been acquired over a long period of time and are not related to any special field of study. The test consists of three scored sections:

- Verbal – 30 minute section (30 questions)
  - Analyze and evaluate written material; analyze relationships among sentences
- Quantitative – 45 minute section (28 questions)
  - Basic math skills to reason quantitatively and solve problems
- Analytical – 60 minute section (35 questions)
  - Understand structured sets of relationships; analyze and evaluate arguments

The School of Theology and Ministry requires a **minimum combined score of 900** for the verbal and quantitative sections on the GRE.

### Miller Analogies Test

The *Miller Analogies Test* is a standardized test of verbal analogies used to assist graduate departments and schools in their admissions process. The MAT is a one hour exam consisting of 120 problems and is offered as a paper and pencil test or computer-based test. The School of Theology and Ministry requires a **minimum score of 396** on the MAT.

For Oklahoma and Tulsa area applicants, both tests are available locally, and you may take the tests at local computer testing centers. The GRE is offered Monday through Saturday, for a fee of \$160.00, at the Prometric Testing Center located at 3015 East Skelly Drive (the 3000 Center), Suite 254. Call 918.747.9333 for an appointment. The MAT is offered Monday through Friday, for a fee of \$65.00, at the OSU-Tulsa Campus, Learning Services Center, North Hall 103, located at 700 North Greenwood Avenue. Call 918.594.8232 for an appointment.

When taking an entrance exam, be sure to select ORU as the recipient for your exam results, using the following codes: GRE #6552, MAT #2173. You will also receive a score report; however, Graduate Admissions must have an original exam report **directly from the testing service** for this requirement to be considered officially met. If the MAT is taken on computer, a preliminary score may be given to you. Please fax a copy to 918.495.6725, and your application file will be submitted to the Admissions Committee with that copy if the file is otherwise complete. Your acceptance would be conditional, pending receipt of the official exam score.



## INTERNATIONAL GRADUATE ENTRANCE EXAM INFORMATION

The School of Theology and Ministry requires a recent exam score from **one** of the following options for an application file to be considered by the Admissions Committee. If the native language of instruction in the university/college attended was English, you may choose from either the Graduate Record Exam (GRE) or the Miller Analogies Test (MAT). International students whose language of instruction was not English may choose either to sit for the *Test of English as a Foreign Language* (TOEFL) **or** the *International English Language Testing System* (IELTS).

### Graduate Record Examination (General Test)

The *Graduate Record Examination (General Test)* measures verbal, quantitative, and analytical skills that have been acquired over a long period of time and are not related to any special field of study. The test consists of three scored sections:

- Verbal – 30 minute section (30 questions)
  - Analyze and evaluate written material; analyze relationships among sentences
- Quantitative – 45 minute section (28 questions)
  - Basic math skills to reason quantitatively and solve problems
- Analytical – 60 minute section (35 questions)
  - Understand structured sets of relationships; analyze and evaluate arguments

The School of Theology and Ministry requires a **minimum combined score of 900** for the verbal and quantitative sections on the GRE.

### TOEFL or IELTS

The *Test of English as a Foreign Language* (TOEFL) measures the ability of non-native speakers of English to use and understand English as it is spoken, written, and heard in college and university settings. The TOEFL test is offered in two different formats depending on the test taker's location: the Internet-based test and the paper-based test. In the countries where the TOEFL iBT is not offered, the TOEFL Paper-based test (TOEFL PBT) is given which measures listening comprehension, structure and written expression, and reading comprehension. The School of Theology and Ministry requires a minimum score of 79 for the TOEFL iBT format or 550 for the TOEFL PBT format.

*International English Language Testing System* (IELTS) tests are held in over 500 centers with tests up to four times a month. IELTS respects international diversity and is fair to anyone who sits the test, regardless of nationality. You will be given the option to choose from two types of IELTS test: Academic or General Training, depending on whether you want to study, work or migrate. Both modules are made up of four parts – Listening, Reading, Writing and Speaking. IELTS results are graded on the unique IELTS 9-band scale. The School of Theology and Ministry requires applicants to take the Academic IELTS test and score a minimum band score of 7.0.
