Who is eligible?

- Students in their final two semesters of undergraduate studies with a 3.0 cumulative GPA

How many Graduate Courses can be taken in a semester?

- Students may register for up to six credit hours of graduate level courses in their final two undergraduate semesters or three credit hours in a summer session.

What are the benefits of Fast Track?

- Students can earn up to 12 credit hours of graduate work while completing their undergraduate degree.
- Students **SAVE MONEY!**

No extra tuition charge when taking between 12.5 and 18.5 undergraduate credit hours. Students pay undergraduate tuition rate per credit hour in summer sessions or when enrollment is either below 12.5 or exceeds 18.5 semester hours. As much as one semester of graduate work can be completed saving student's tuition, fees, and living expenses:

Tuition and Fees: \$6010
Room and Board: \$4300
Books: \$630
Estimated Total Savings: \$10,940
