David W. Anderson (BA, Gordon College; MEd, Temple University; EdD, University of North Dakota; Certificate in Theological Studies, Bethel Seminary) is currently Emeritus Professor of Education at Bethel

University, St. Paul, MN. He has authored many articles and given presentations and state, national, and international conferences related to special education or disability ministry, most recently *Toward a Theology of Special Education: Integrating Faith and Practice*, published by WestBow Press, He is also President of Crossing Bridges Inc., a non-profit ministry whose primary mission is to bring light and hope to people with disabilities and their families in developing nations.

For the past twelve years, Ndindi has been designing high school science curriculum and has conducted research in areas relevant to the issues of education and social justice for immigrant youth and adults. Along with her work with secondary science students, Ndindi teaches identity, culture and classroom courses for the Longy School of Music of Bard College, Masters in Teaching Program.

Chase Andre (Pacifist Fight Club): Agapic Empathy: Engaging perspectives amidst a culture war

Chase Andre (BA Biola University) is a cofounder of Pacifist Fight Club, an online community which hosts roundtable discussions, bent on following Jesus toward justice, while maintaining a nonviolent

approach within a warring culture. Acutely concerned with the Church regaining its prophetic voice in society, Chase seeks to practice and communicate the ethics of Jesus' teaching. Academically, he is fascinated by those who shift cultural paradigms through rhetorical experiences. Presently, Chase lives in the East LA neighborhood of Boyle Heights in the intentional community of Hollenbeck House; he and seven housemates live in an oversized ranchero, exploring LA and discovering the kingdom of God at work in the margins of the metropolis.



Calvin G. Roso (Oral Roberts University): Helping the needy through education: Examining the links between poverty research and orphan education

Taking the Good News to the far reaches of the world is Dr. Calvin Roso's passion. For the past summers he has traveled with teenagers to Latin American countries where they have

delivered rice, beans, and the gospel to the poverty stricken people in cities and mountain villages. Dr. Roso has been involved in Christian education since the early 1990s, active in the professional development of Christian educators through the International Christian Accrediting Association (ICAA), an organization associated with ORU. In addition, he has published several teachers' guides and numerous articles regarding curriculum and instruction.
