Devotional	Prof. Megan Weinkauff, College of Business, spoke on the necessity of us being whole persons ourselves if we are to make whole leaders of our students. She shared her own testimony of the consequences of childhood abuse and how that hidden pain affected her through adolescence and early adulthood. Yet, by God's grace, and through both counseling and miraculous healing, she now "lives free." She encouraged the faculty to risk vulnerability and to seek healing and wholeness that we might be an example to our students.
President's Report	<p>Dr. Wilson's report included updates on the University and upcoming events.</p> <p>Dr. Wilson presented a series of slides and data illustrating recent analytics of global demographics and ORU's involvement. These included maps of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • World Religions—Noteworthy was the Christian majority in large areas of North and South America and Sub-Saharan Africa. • Christian People—Illustrating the Christian population centers, totaling ~2.4 billion. • Spirit-Empowered People—Scattered across the U.S., Europe and Asia, with large blocks in Central and NE South America and Sub-Saharan Africa. The Whole Leaders for the Whole World Campaign is underway. The \$75 million campaign includes \$60 million for Capital Projects, \$10 million for Scholarships for Learners from Every Nation, and \$5 million for a Center for Global Leadership. We currently have \$53 million—the Greens have given \$23 million and are providing a 3:1 match of donations for the capital projects.

Dr. Wilson presented site maps and architectural renderings of the first phase, which includes the Welcome Center, Media Arts Center, and Library (which includes the Holy Spirit Library). The entrance from Lewis Ave will be a statement of who we are—from the Praying/Healing Hands, to the Welcome Center, to academic excellence and the prominence of the Holy Spirit in the Library, and going into every person's world through the arts in the Media Arts Center.

Laura Bishop encouraged the Faculty to participate in the campaign. 100% of the Board has donated, and 100% faculty participation sends a strong positive message.

The ORU Faculty Christmas Reception will be held in the Lippencott Auditorium, GLC on December 9th, 6pm, followed by Sing! An Irish Christmas Event in the Mabee Center.
