Welcome	Mrs. Lisa Wilson welcomed faculty and coordinated a give-away.	
Devotional	Dr. Curtis Ellis, Dean of the College of Arts and Cultural Studies, spoke on "Who would make room for me"? Coming to faith while in graduate school, he was discipled by people who "made room" for him, looking past his initial attitudes and behaviors and treating him with patience and grace. The story of the good Samaritan in Luke 10:25-37 challenges us to expand our concept of neighbor, to not exclude, but make room for others, seeing them as made in the image of God.	
President's Report	Pentecostal World Conference—Fall Break As chair, Dr. Wilson spoke at the 26th Pentecostal World Conference in Seoul, Korea, accompanied by members of the ORU faculty and administration. This was followed by a prayer meeting held at the DMZ and meetings of international representatives of Empowered 21. Fall 2023 Initiatives to Build Residential Enrollment Dr. Wilson and other administrators have been working with Enrollment Management to identify and implement strategies to build residential enrollment. These include: 1. Activate the Experience It! Campaign (including virtual) 2. Streamline the student admissions experience. 3. Deploy a comprehensive global strategy that will increase the international student population to 30% by 2025 and reach 195 nations by 2030. 4. Investigate and market personalized degree plans. 5. Enhance Advantage conversion strategies. 6. Expand recruiting strategies in Texas. 7. Demonstrate the affordability of ORU including enhanced FAFSA strategies. 8. Create new Oklahoma/Tulsa recruiting strategies. 9. Launch new experiential events. 10. Implement recruiting strategies for gap year students. 11. Add new academic programs that meet market demand. 12. Establish a parent engagement office (to include a 1st generation parent program). 13. Pursue ORU designation as an official Hispanic-serving institution. 14. Build new ad distribution strategies (national ad campaign). 15. Initiate new strategies for local church engagement.	
	Whole Leaders for the Whole World, Phase II: They are Worth It! Phase II focuses on facilities and scholarships to directly benefit students. The \$50 million target includes a new dining hall \$25 million, two new residence halls \$15 million, renovations to EMR and Claudius residence halls \$5 million, Quest First Scholarships \$2.5 million, and international scholarships \$2.5 million.	

International Students & Scholarships—Demographic trends in the US indicate a 15% drop in the number of potential college students 2025-2029, compounded by a likely 7% drop in those choosing college. Globally, however, that age cohort is growing steadily. This coincides with international growth in the Spirit-empowered movement and an inability of many nations to meet the college needs of qualified students. ORU is well-positioned to receive international students. USNWR ranks ORU as one of the 15 national universities with the greatest number of international students. New nations represented in the student body this fall include: Armenia, Bhutan, Iceland, Iraq, Laos, Oman, South Sudan, Suriname, and Tonga.

First Generation College Students—make up 35% of the Fall 2022 incoming class.

Hispanic Students—24% of ORU students identify as Hispanic/Latino. At the 25% level, ORU qualifies as a Hispanic Serving Institution.

Renovations and Renderings of New Buildings—Dr. Wilson provided explanation for a series of photos of sample renovations, plots of the campus layouts, and options for placement of the new dining hall and residence halls.

Provost's Report: Dr. Reid-Martinez

At the October 24, 2022 meeting of the Academic Council, college representatives received updates from the Registrar and discussed Gen Ed Committee proposals, the student withdrawal process and software for course scheduling.

The following proposed by the Gen Ed Committee were approved:

- GEN 308—Art and Story (Scaffolded Interdisciplinary Course, SIC)
- BIO 307—Advanced Tropical Biology (Globalization, GO course)
- GEN 305—Introduction to Statistical Analysis of Language (SIC)
- CJS 201—Introduction to Criminal Justice
- Online students can choose between two orientation courses: GEN 114 Online Learning Strategies or GEN 115 (Whole Leaders Foundations).
- Online program changes that align with approved curriculum do not require subsequent approval by the Gen Ed Committee or Academic Council

-General Education Outcomes—The Gen Ed Committee was asked to continue to refine definitions of select terminology. Subject-specific department chairs will be asked to clarify terminology as it relates to certain outcomes.

- -Faculty advisors will receive weekly emails with a list of students withdrawing from courses
- -The Academic Council formally encouraged the university's adoption of Coursedog or similar software to assist with scheduling, curriculum change proposals, and catalog. -The Classical Learning Test was discussed as an option for an additional university entrance exam.

The report was accepted unanimously after a motion by Paul Vickery, second by Brittany Gomez.
