Start of Meeting 11:00 am in the Global Learning Center

Welcome Mrs. Lisa Wilson welcomed faculty and coordinated a give-away.

Devotional Titus Stevens, an undergraduate international student from Brazil described his own challenges in seeking direction for his life. Coming from a family of missionaries and church-planters, he struggled at length to determine how he should fit into that ministry. Ultimately, he came to a place of surrender and found the truth of II Cor. 12:9, that God's grace is sufficient and that His "power is made perfect in weakness". As we acknowledge our need, we can approach the throne of grace with confidence and receive grace, help, and guidance (Heb. 4:14-16)...and that guidance brought him to ORU.

President's Report

The last UFM was held in November, 2022.

Asbury Revival
ORU sent representatives to Asbury to observe and learn. The size of the meetings presented practical challenges for the campus. Though not evident in the media coverage, the altar and prayer ministry throughout the meetings was largely manned by Asbury faculty.

Principles from the Asbury revival; it was: 1-Spontaneous; 2-Student-led; 3-Simple 4-Pure; 5-Hunger for God; 6-Administrative challenges; 7-Had an ongoing message

Dr. Wilson noted that ORU was in the midst of RenewU at the same time as the Asbury revival and that ORU has been experiencing this at some level for quite some time. This is particularly evident in the student-led worship/prayer sets Tuesday through Friday evenings in the Prayer Tower.

Board of Trustees--Advance
Every 3 years, the Board participates in an extended "advance" to develop relationships and engage in long-term planning. The January, 2023 meeting was held in Hawaii.

Valentine's Day Dinner
Dr. and Mrs. Wilson hosted a Valentine's Day Dinner and answered questions about dating and marriage.

Enrollment Update
Enrollment for Spring 2023 was up slightly from 2022. Spring 2022 we had \$1 million in government funds to distribute to students—not so this year. The number of new students increased over last spring, but we lost more from the fall, perhaps in part due to the long winter break. Graduate programs are growing; undergrad residential was lower.

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| | <p>A total of 121 nations are represented this spring, up from 115 last spring. The top five nations are Nigeria, Indonesia, China, India, and Colombia. All 50 states are represented, with the top 5 being: Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana, Florida, and California.</p> <p>Recruitment Dr. Wilson reviewed and discussed the Building Residential Enrollment plan, which is made up of 15 initiatives, many of which have academic components. The Advantage program (online ORU courses for high school students) continues to grow. We are pursuing designation as a Hispanic Serving Institution, though the qualifications are challenging to meet.</p> <p>New Programs One of the 15 initiatives is to investigate and market personalized degree plans. This effort has yielded three new programs: 1-Integrated Studies, renamed from the current Liberal Studies program. 2-Applied Science Program. This is consistent with the industry's name for this type of degree and may include courses from the College of Health Sciences. 3-Leadership and Innovation in Science. This program currently under development includes certificates in Leadership Studies, Artificial Intelligence, and Spirit-Empowered Leadership.</p> <p>Five Year Adaptive Plan Faculty input into the process is encouraged. | <p>Provost's Report: Dr. Reid-Martinez</p> | <p>At the February 20, 2023 meeting of the Academic Council, college representatives received information on Key Program Assessments for General Education and voted on the Classical Learning Test as an entrance assessment for ORU. Approved General Education outcomes guiding the KPAs are:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. GEN 1 - Core Literacy. Demonstrate a breadth of knowledge essential to a Spirit-empowered, classical liberal arts education through effective communication. 2. GEN 2 - Intercultural Knowledge and Engagement. Engage diverse cultures by integrating a Christian worldview with intercultural and historical knowledge. 3. GEN 3 - Lifelong Wellness. Demonstrate knowledge and skills that promote healthy lifestyle choices to develop spiritual, mental, physical, and social wholeness. 4. GEN 4 - Global Issues, Problem-Solving, Critical Thinking, and Creativity. Demonstrate problem-solving using critical thinking, creativity, collaboration, and ethical reasoning to address global issues. <p>The Council voted to add the CLT alongside the ACT and SAT as a means of assessing student capacity for entrance to ORU.</p> <p>The report was accepted by unanimous vote after a motion and second.</p> |
