- Overview of the Program
 - Initiative began as grassroots initiative in 2001 for HLC approval
 - Original Need sprung from concerns about writing
 - Review of Mission Statement
 - One workshop / year
 - Goal: Both students and faculty more please with results of better writing
 - Original Model: Cohorts for faculty WAC development
 - WI – Writing Intensive classes are no longer as popular as they once were
 - Website available for WAC – Available on the faculty/staff intranet
 - Newsletter announces award winners and important WAC issues
 - Chris (Putnam) won last WAC award
 - Kerry (Loescher) won prior to Chris
 - Members of the WAC committee are sent to conferences to learn WAC
 - Benefactor makes the WAC committee possible
 - LTC – Nashville – the name of the business that sponsors the WAC committee
 - Phyllis Shelton-Pomakoy
 - She'll (benefactor) be here for Golden Week
 - Steven, Evie, Evan showed an interest in Phyllis speaking in class
- Basic WAC Concepts
 - WAC – Writing across the Curriculum
 - WID – Writing in the Discipline
 - The purpose of WID is to make students proficient writers in their discipline
 - Workshops were used to make the WID concepts known to faculty
 - Students are often confused by the writing conventions of the discipline
 - Faculty need to help students write better
 - Ex: Students are actually encouraged to write in passive voice for the science disciplines
 - Ken Weed was very successful at implementing WID
 - (Evan) – The process of writing helps students to think critically.
Ex: A well written proposal is what is required for a grant

- Lori – The WAC workshops are designed to implement faculty giving writing assignments
- **International WAC conferences take place every other year, and will take place in 2016**
 - Deadline for papers is Oct. 1, 2015
 - Some of the faculty members will be available to go to Michigan June 2016 to participate
 - Handout Given
 - Marsha will be going to the WAC conference
- **Old Business**
 - Ted Talk style presentations have been suggested so that the WAC concepts can be shared in classes (Evan is willing to produce videos)
 - **New/Additional suggestion – Bringing in professionals from industry that can be featured in the WAC videos**
 - **The “WAC template for WID Resource Videos” is the handout that would be used to prepare the interviewees for their interview**
 - Question from Evie: “What is it about the way debate team students learn that makes them better prepared for writing than those who do not?”
 - Answer from Evan: “There is a process to deconstruct an argument. Regina Farmer would be a good resource to identify that process.”
 - Lori – Hang on to that idea. This would be a good topic for a workshop.
- **New Business**
 - Goals for 2016:
 - Evan – Dream. We can come up with resources this year, and my role is to get the resources we need to improve the writing of our students.
 - Discussion- WAC Committee Member Goals – Organic conversation:
 - Chris – I used to only teach writing, but now I’m working with event planning and other PR topics. Jonathon Cyprowski and the yearbook team could use some additional support producing the yearbook.
 - Lori – One thing we tried in the past is supporting graduate schools with a dedicated student worker for help with writing. But I’m wary about being able to support the media department with a TA. But there may be some technology that we can use.
 - Steven – Can we Crowdsource the writing of yearbook materials by asking the various respective students in other departments/clubs to create content for the yearbook? Could be enabled by technology
 - Lois – Can we train TAs to be better at helping faculty members grade?
 - Lori - WID Workshop topic: Identifying WID idiosyncrasies and evaluating writing based on the output
 - Steven – The online writing portal – Smart thinking – ran out of budget last year. Let’s not let that happen again.
 - Lori – Students can also go to the writing center in student resources. Writer’s workbench is software they can use.

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- Steven – Let's consider Hemingway App <http://www.hemingwayapp.com> as an additional tool for student help with editing.
